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Preface

Within the boundaries of McDonough County. Illinois are more than a hundred cemeteries and gravesites ranging in size from a single burial site to the expansive Oakwood Cemetery at Macomb. Within these cemeteries are the remains of an estimated 40,000 individuals who have died since the first settler arrived here over 150 years ago. Graves of countless others are scattered over the countryside of McDonough County; but, exact sites of many of these resting places are no longer known forvarious reasons. During the early days of this county, there were obviously nocentral burial grounds; thus, a pioneer family having the misfortune of losing one of its members placed the ceased in a grave on a family homestead and erected a makeshift marker. Anumber of these family burial grounds later became public cemeteries, however, many of thegrave sites soon became "lost". Crude wooden markers or hand engraved stone soon succumbed to the elements and were never replaced; scores of families moved further west after staying in this area only a short time and the gravesites of their loved ones shortly became insignificant mounds of earth; a number of families passing through this vicinity suffered individual losses. A prime example of the latter is contained in a history of BethelTownship. In 1830, four children of an emigrantfamily died while enroute through McDonough County. They were buried near their places of death which occurred about two miles southwest of Fandon. All traces of those graves have long been gone. During the summer of 1834, a widow lady died ather home innorthernTennesseeTownship. Her coffin of dressed walnut lumber was built by a local cabinet maker and she was buried in the timber near her home. Within a few years, no evidence remained to indicate the presence of her final resting place. A family who created and excellent farm from the prairies a few miles north of Macomb, maintained a fenced family burial site for several years. This cemetery contained the graves of about 12 former family members. During the early 1900's, the farm changed ownership. Shortly thereafter, the new owner removed all the stones, took down the fence and this graveyard became part of a cornfield. These areonly three of the countless incidents involving the total disappearance of burial sites. At this time, it is impossible to determine the locations of hundreds of individual's graves in this county.

Vandalism is responsible for the destruction of many grave stones. Countless markers have been partially or totally destroyed. Inscriptions have been obliterated by gunshot blasts, stones have been broken into dozens of pieces, and some markers have been entirely removed from their original locations.

While weather-wear and vandalism accounts for most of the destruction of individual tombstones, neglect is directly responsible for the eventual deterioration of graveyards. Several local cemeteries have had no protective fencing for a number of years and the grounds have become grazing land for livestock. Groundhogs and other burrowing animals have undermined large portions of various cemeteries. Some areas are nearly invisible because of massive growth of weeds and brush. Stones have fallen, broken, and become completely covered with soil and debris.

The overall condition of our county cemeteries is a pathetic case. While some grounds are well maintained, or at least partially kept-up by various families, many have been totally forgotten. This situation is appalling and should never have come about. Apparently, lack of time, expense, and most of all regard has brought about the present-day poor conditions of many of our rural cemeteries.

Genealogical notes accompanying the various cemetery listings were prepared from a wide variety of sources including: Local area history books and atlases; newspaper files; county, state, and federal archives; family histories. These notes were collected at random from readily available sources and little, or no attempts were made to search for material for more complete genealogies. These notes are presented only for the purposes of identification and/or clarification.

Every attempt has been made to present complete and accurate information. Readers will find errors and omissions. Others will not agree with portions of my findings; however, no information contained herein is based solely on assumption or guesswork. It must be remembered that this information has been prepared for use only as a tool for further research and that nothing must be taken as final and absolute.

The larger cemeteries contained in these volumes are accompanied by grave location charts. These charts in no way are intended to represent any professionally prepared plat or survey that may exist. Their preparation and presentation are solely for general location purposes.

When copying inscriptions from grave markers, it is sometimes impossible to read some portions of the engraving. Names, dates, ages, etc. that were found to be unclear or totally missing are indicated by the use of question marks or dashes, i.e., SPICER, James T., infant son of ?J.B. & S.J.?; d. _____; age _____. The letters or numbers enclosed in parenthesis following the inscription, indicated general location as indicated on the accompanying chart.


ADDENDUM

Mr. Lester's Magnum Opus is nothing short of monumental. It is not easy to gain access to many of these historic family burial sites. By the time of Mr. Lester's survey (1970's) numerous plots were long left abandoned, overgrown with trees and weeds and monuments under attack by weather, livestock, vandals, and property owners who did not care about the burial sites of McDonough County's brave pioneers. Thankfully, we now (2012) have laws to protect our county's historical legacy and these final resting gardens.

I am in awe of Mr. Lester for his transcriptions of hard-to-read tombstones and his laborious typing of his 18 Volumes of the Rural Cemeteries of McDonough County. He did not have access to a computer. In addition to transcribing information from tombstones, he had to painstakingly access county records (e.g. 1840 county tax list), federal census records, and local newspapers requiring a great deal of time and effort. As a genealogist in 2012, I have access to the internet with fast access to US Census records, Family Search (records kept by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints) and numerous other legal documents, books, and family journals. Mr. Lester used an old-fashioned key-strike, ribbon tape typewriter where mistakes were hard to correct and appear as overstrikes. There are very few attesting to his skill as a typist. What an US Census record will not contain are the names and dates of infants who died between census surveys. Mr. Lester's tombstone records give names and dates of children, whose lives were brief, but would otherwise be lost to history without his efforts. Frequently, he provides names of brothers and sisters, fathers and mothers that allows for completion of family group sheets.

Another work of love for those who dared to settle the prairie lands of western Illinois and raise their families is being performed by Dr. A. Gil Belles. He has been able to install signs for each of these rural cemeteries and provide GPS (Global Positioning System) information making it easier for anyone wishing to visit a rural cemetery to help them actually find it. Gil also works closely with Boy Scouts and other civic groups to help cleanup, clear brush and dead trees, locate buried tombstones, and restore stones. My revision of Mr. Lester's document will provide information on all cemetery restoration projects.


Any changes made to Mr. Lester's original work was done in blue color font. His maps were scanned and copied into the text and remain like his original work and are not subject to editing. His text was transcribed using MS Word, enabling me to control font size and color. Retyping text also leaves room for typo errors. Mr. Lester's rare typo errors are corrected but not displayed in blue. This MS Word document allows on-the-fly editing of any "Notes, Corrections, Additions, and Changes" found at the end of every cemetery. This was Mr. Lester's intent to produce a working document and improve accuracy about the information on those buried. I have retyped state abbreviations as they are now used (e.g. IL, instead of Ill.). On 1840 county tax lists I omitted cents (e.g. \$140, instead of \$140.00). The current MS Word font uses less space, thus, placing more text per line. This shrinks his documents and reduces pages. This, then, changes page numbering in each Table of Contents. 

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
Areas covered by volumes I - XVII "Cemeteries of McDonough County, Illinois"



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
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
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
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
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
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









OLD MACOMB CEMETERY

Location: Emmet Township, NE¼, section 35; west edge of Macomb on Wigwam Hollow Road, just north of West Adams Road. [In 2012 entrance moved to West Adams; corner lot deeded to City of Macomb; In 2012 a decorative metal fence was installed on the north and east sides] 40° 23' 47.1" N: 90° 33' 19.5"W

Remarks: This, the original Macomb City cemetery, was established in 1830. Histories of the county report that the first burial here was that of a daughter of Peter Hale – who lived on the site of the cemetery; the second burial was in earl 1831, when Truman Bowen died. Because of the absence of dressed lumber for a coffin, Mr. Bowen was buried in a casket built from parts of a wagon bed. The third person to be buried in this cemetery was reportedly a young girl who was burned by hot coals by her stepfather. Of the three first interments here, only the stone of Mr. Bowen could be located in 1975.

According to city officials, cemetery records were destroyed by a fire several years ago and, apparently, no other records are now available. Years of neglect, damage by vandalism, and normal wearing away of the stones by the weather has resulted in an overall poor condition at this cemetery at this time. A great number of the stones have been broken; piles of stones ---- or portions of stones – lie in the cemetery corners or against trees. The following listing of names is in two parts. Part one includes all names taken from the monuments found during this study, made in mid-1975. Part two lists information extracted from a survey made in 1935 and contains names of a number of individuals whose stones were not located in 1975.

PART 2

Naylor was the son of Benjamin Naylor, of English descent. He began learning the carpenters trade at age 19 and his first piece of work was a railing for a flight of stairs in the State Pen. at Lexington, KY; he received \$600 for that work; he later helped build the first McDonough County courthouse and built a frame house in Macomb, the first of its kind here; he abandoned the trade in 1842 and began farming in Emmet twp. In 1831 he married Adeline Bailey, a native of VA; they had 6 children – John J.; Wm. B., George W., Sibian; Martha C. and Albert. Four sons served in the Civil War; Sibian, John, and Martha C. died prior to 1885. His wife died in Jun 1880 and was buried along with her children in the Old Macomb Cemetery. George moved to Dakota; Benjamin T. died Dec 8, 1883 in Hire twp. and his death was caused by a runaway team of horses.

NAYLOR (Cont'd): Wm B. Naylor, 2nd son of Benj. T., was born Jul 11, 1835 in Macomb; he married Aug 9, 1855 to Melinda L. McCord, a daughter of Wm. McCord. OLD CATHOLIC CEMETERY

Location: Chalmers Township, NW¼, section 2; the extreme northwest corner of the McDonough County 4-H grounds west of Macomb. [One-third mile north of US Hwy 136 on N. Quailwalk Rd.] 40^{0} 27' 19.18" N: 90^{0} 42' 51.1"W

Remarks: Very little remains of this, the original Catholic cemetery for the Macomb area. The site is located on the east side of a roadway that has been closed to through traffic for a number of years. Apparently, the majority of those originally buried here were removed to St. Paul's Cemetery in Macomb when that area was set aside as a Catholic cemetery. The following is quoted from an early history of McDonough County: "The Catholics buried their dead west of Macomb, but through negligence had no road to their grave yard, and when they tried to get a road, the men they put in office did as they always had done --- only when they asked a ticket to vote --- looked on them as unreasonable and left them to help themselves. A lot therefore was bought for Joseph Burton, opposite the city grave yard, and the Catholic dead removed."

2012: This cemetery is totally accessible on N. Quailwalk Road {E. 1000 St) as this road was opened for pass through traffic when Hwy 136 was widened around 2000. It is now well maintained.



BAILEY CEMETERY

Location: Chalmers Township; SW¼, section 12. One and one-half miles southwest of Macomb. This cemetery is located half way between E1000 St and E1200 St on China Road (N1000 Rd). $40^{\circ} 25' 34"$ N: $90^{\circ} 41' 43.9"$ W

Remarks: The grounds are completely fenced; however, only a small portion of the cemetery appears to have any maintenance on a regular basis; the entire north of the section designated "S" on the chart below is covered by a heavy growth of weeds and brush. Many stones are broken and badly weatherworn. This study was made in April, 1975.

2012: The entire cemetery is now well maintained. It was cleared as an Eagle Service Project by Tim Dively.

BONN: George (Death notice, in part, from The Macomb Journal, Jul 6, 1882): "G.E. Bonn was killed by a train yesterday; he lived with his widowed mother and sister near the residence of Geo. W. Kruse in Chalmers township. His father died several years ago."

BUTTERFIELD: Elizabeth (NOTE: No stone located for this individual) (Obit, in part, from The Macomb Journal, May 24, 1883): "Mrs. Elizabeth Butterfield died in this city on May 22, aged 74 years, 1 month. She was born in the Hocking Valley, PA. Her maiden name was Avery. At an early age with her parents she came to near Columbus, OH where she grew to womanhood and was married to Greene Butterfield. In 1834, with her husband and family, she came to Illinois and lived in Schuyler Co. until 1845 when they went to Galesburg, Knox Co. In 1861, she moved to Macomb and since then her husband has died. Of a family of 10 children, only 2 are living – Mrs. Geo. Gloyd and G.G. Butterfield, with whom she was living. Burial was in the Bailey Cemetery, southwest of Macomb where her husband and children are buried....."

William W., Ellen E., Lewis M., and FranklinC.; (Article appearing in a March 1873 Macomb Journal): "William Butterfield and 3 of his 5 children all died of spotted fever at their home a few miles southwest of Macomb. Another son, aged 18 years, also had the disease, but recovered.)"

CLUGSTON: Ann Eliza (Obit, in part, from The Macomb Journal, Sep 8, 1881): "Ann Eliza Clugston died in Chalmers township on Sep 3, 1881 aged 24y 11m and 13d. She was a daughter of John Johnson of Chalmers township. Born in 1856 in this county; married Warren Clugston 4 years ago and moved to Kansas. She is survived by her husband and 2 children...."

ELLIS: James (Obit, in part, from The Macomb Journal, Sep 27, 1883): "James Ellis died at his residence in Chalmers township on Sep 20, 1883 aged 67 years. He was born in Denegal, Ireland and came to this country 33 years ago settling in the State of New York where he remained for 5 years. From there he moved with his family to Illinois. He married Margaret Walker and they had 4 sons and 3 daughters, all now living....."

HALL: William R., was a son of Richard & Hannah Jane (Sloan) Hall who were married in this county on Aug 30, 1849.

PARKINS: Henry Clay; d. May 12, 1922; aged 62y 10m 10d; b. Jul 2, 1859, in Schuyler Co. IL; son of John & Mary (Lewis) Parkins; married Rachel Johnson; worked as blacksmith; died at 725 E. Jefferson St, Macomb, IL.

PENROSE: Elijah and Martha Sullivan were married in this county on Sep 28, 1848.

SNYDER: Elijah (NOTE: No stone was found for this individual). Elijah Snyder died on Jan 8, 1898 at the poor farm where he worked as a cook. He was about 72 years old and unmarried. Death was caused by congestive chill. Born at Canton, NJ and was a baker by trade. Traveled twice around the world spending 3 years in China and sometime in Africa. A veteran of the Mexican War, serving on the American side and drew a pension. Survived by a sister, who lives in NJ. Member of the Masons at one time. Funeral on Jan 10th and burial in Bailey Cemetery south of Macomb.

WAGNER: Jacob (NOTE: No stone was located for this individual). From veterans records: Army, US Vol Inf.

BROOKING CEMETERY

Location: This family burial plot was located about ½ mile due east of a farm house now (1975) owned by the Mansir family [Macomb Township, Section 7; just west of west runway of Macomb airport]. The Brooking family owned this property for several years; about 1911 the farm was sold to the Bruninga family. Neighborhood sources who remember this area, recall the location of the cemetery and state that there were about a dozen stones here for several years. At the present time, there is no trace of this cemetery; no one can furnish any information as to the circumstances surrounding the closing of this cemetery nor the present whereabouts of the stones and markers. Genealogical Notes – Brooking Cemetery

Thomas A. Brooking moved to Macomb in 1834 and was the 2nd son of a family of 11 children --- 8 daughters and 3 sons. He was born in Nottaway Co. VA near Richmond on Jan 20, 1795. His parents were Thomas Vivian and Elizabeth Sherwin Brooking; Elizabeth was the daughter of Col. Samuel Sherwin of the Rev. War. Thomas A. studied law and later moved to KY; he was admitted to the bar in VA; he abandoned the law profession a short time later for unknown reasons. He and his family settled in the Versailles , KY area and were in the mercantile trade there. He married Mary Louisa Threshly there on Jan 25, 1816. Mr. Brooking died in 1858 and he and Mary had 13 children. Seven were living in 1885. Edward died while in the service with the 137th IL Vol (died at Memphis --- see Hamilton Cemetery). Wm. farmed north of Macomb; A.V. farmed and was a stock dealer near Macomb. R.S. was a trader. Mrs. Jane Randolph lived in Macomb and she was the widow of Wm. H. Randolph; Mrs. Augusta Palmer moved to Palestine, TX. Mrs. Lucy Snyder moved to Carrollton, MO. Mrs. Julia Randolph, wife of J.H. Randolph lived at Ft. Scott, KA; after his marriage, Brooking returned to Richmond and lived there 3 years; Then, to Union Co. KY and ran a sulfur springs for 5 years; then moved to Princeton, KY and there till the fall of 1834. Moved to this county and taught school here 2 seasons. He then was engaged in the making of brick north of town (Macomb) at the site of Oakwood Cemetery. He later moved to a farm, later owned by his son, Wm.T. Lived there till spring of 1850 and bought a hotel on the west side of Macomb square and was there for a few years. He died Feb 25, 1858 and was buried on the old homestead. Another daughter, Elizabeth, who married Joseph P. Updegraff on Sep 16, 1835, died in Oct of 1872. They had 2 daughters – Imogene who married J. A. Gates of Oswego, KA and Joseph Atherton, also of Oswego.

Thomas Brooking moved to the Macomb area in 1835 (the above paragraph says 1834) during the spring of that year built a double log-cabin on Section 30, Macomb township, on the present site of Oakwood Cemetery. He taught the first school classes in the township and held those classes in the original county courthouse, which was located on the NE corner of the square. Mr. Brooking and his family, at that time, lived in a small house located across the street from the courthouse - the present location of the Union Nat'l Bank.

Alexander Vivian Brooking was born Feb 25, 1829 at Sulfur Springs, KY; son of Thomas and grandson of Thomas Vivian Brooking. Father was a native of Richmond, VA; mother, Mary Threshley Brooking was born in Lexington, KY. In 1834, A.V. moved with his parents to Macomb; his father was a school teacher and lawyer. Thomas bought 150A claim and worked this while teaching during the winter. A.V. was the 9th in a family of 12 children; lived at home till age 22 and with his father, bought total of 550A in this county. Took over half of the farm, and in 1854 took over (bought) entire farm from his father; lived there 11 years. Moved to Macomb in 1865 and took over Randolph Hotel (there in 1907). Sold his homestead and bought another farm; engaged in stock-raising and feeding horses. Farm – 2.5 miles north of Macomb. A.V. married Aug 27, 1851 to Elizabeth H. Randolph; she was a native of OH; schooling in IL; she died in Aug 1865; left 3 children ---- Thomas A., Melvina R., and Anna Louisa. On May 1, 1865 [is this date right as this remarriage is before his 1st wife died?] Brooking married Mary e. Butler, a native of this state. Had the following children: Frederick V.; Ethelin; Estella V.; Brainerd B.; and Winnie Viola. A.V. was a member of the Masonic Order (Macomb Lodge #17 and Morse Chapter #19); was living in Macomb in 1907.

Wm. T. Brooking (age 83 years in 1907) was born May 6, 1824 in Union Co. KY; son of Thomas A.; mother was a daughter of William and Lucy Upshaw Thresley, natives of KY and England, respectively. Both Thomas A. and his father were vets of the War of 1812. Thomas established a brick factory north of Macomb on the present site of the Catholic Cemetery. Thomas died in Feb 1858; he had 4 sons and 7 daughters. Wm. T. lived at home till age 26 and then married to Louisiana Walker on Mar 7, 1850; she was a native of IN, born in 1833. Wm. T. veteran of the Mormon War in 1845. He and his wife established a home and a 160A farm across the road from the family homestead (the old Applegate place); sold it in 1864 and then bought 270A of the home place and moved there in 1866. Sold out in 1885 and opened a grocery store in Macomb; returned to the farm in 1893 and bought 80A; retired and moved to Macomb in 1898. School board member for 20 years; assessor in Macomb township in 1870; member of the Masonic fraternity. Mrs. Brooking died on Jan 5, 1902; had 6 children ---- W.A.; Lucian Threeshly; Dolly (married W.M. Winslow); and 2 children who died in infancy, and another who died at age 12 years.

COUNTY FARM CEMETERY [ALMSHOUSE CEMETERY]

Location: Scotland Township; SE¹/₄, section 7; about ¹/₄ mile southwest of intersection of N1050 Rd and E1300 Street (South Candy Lane). 40^{0} 25' 53.1" N: 90^{0} 39' 43.48"W:

All that remains of this cemetery is a lone government headstone of a Civil War veteran. The inscription reads: "Michael Nolan, Pvt., Co "A", 84th ILL Inf.

Before its closure several years ago, the McDonough County Farm was located about a mile south of Macomb in Scotland Township (SE¼, Section 7). The main building was razed in the late 1950's after the property was sold. The cemetery grounds were located east [west] of the former building about one quarter mile; the site was near the top and on the northwest side of a small hill. At this time [1975], it is impossible to determine the number or names of those buried at this location as it appears that all but the single remaining stone have been removed from their original locations.

There has been no fencing around the grounds for several years and the only evidence of it being a cemetery is the government stone of Private Nolan and a number of slight depressions in the ground --- apparently, the locations of other graves.
